



Texas Persimmons

Diospyros texana

This is a small semi-deciduous tree with dark green leaves. It is often low forking or multi-trunked. In South Texas, Texas Persimmons may retain its leaves throughout the winter. It prefers well drained, alkaline soils. A smooth trunk is one of the most striking characteristics of Texas Persimmons—white, pink, and gray colors show beneath the peeling bark.

Texas Persimmons flowers in March and April. They are white, urn-shaped blooms. Persimmons are dioecious trees. They have a small black fruit that ripen in August. The fruit tastes like prunes and are relished by birds and mammals alike. Native Americans used the fruit to make black dye for animal hides. This tree is a host for the Grey Hairstreak and Henry's Elfin caterpillar
